A DAY AT FRANCISCAN CHILDREN'S










I am having my surgery today. The doctors need to learn about my body and brush my teeth. They are going to help me feel better.





First, we walk into the screening area. This is where we are going to answer questions about COVID-19 and get our temperatures taken. COVID-19 is something that can make people feel sick.








After, we walk over to registration. Registration makes sure that the hospital has the right name and birthday.

This is another pre-op room that I might be brought into! Can you spot my friend, Dom?






Then, I will sit on the stretcher. The stretcher is a long bed with wheels.








While in pre-op, the nurse will take my temperature with a thermometer. This is to see how warm my body is. The nurse might touch the thermometer to my head or the side of my face near my ear.








Then, the nurse will gently place something on my finger. It's called a pulse oximeter. It will measure the oxygen in my body by giving my finger a hug.

My goal is to get 100%!






Next, the nurse will take my blood pressure. This is to see how strong my heart and muscles are. She will give your arm a hug with a wrap. If I count to 12, it will be all done.







Then the nurse will listen to my heart and lungs with a stethoscope. This is to hear how good my lungs are at breathing.





It's time to put on my hospital clothes! They look like a long shirt that opens in the back and a pair of pants. They will either be yellow, green or blue.





Now I will meet the child life specialist. She will show me my mask and some pictures of the room. We can also put stickers on my mask.








The child life specialist and the nurse will push me on the bed to my room. I can also talk to my child life specialist about something to do while I use my mask.




